ecently, we held five mid-term sessions in the five counties of Southeastern California Conference (SECC): Imperial, San Diego, Orange, Riverside, and San Bernardino. Our bylaws, or the rules that help us run as an organization, require that we have a meeting halfway between constituency sessions. These meetings provide opportunities for our members to propose agenda items to be considered for our upcoming constituency session.

Seizing the opportunity given by the bylaws, we spent this time sharing how God has

Our conference membership is richly diverse and strong. Executive Secretary Patricia Marruffo reported on our membership trends and

numbers. Although the COVID-19 pandemic has presented challenges we have never seen before, God is still at work throughout our conference territory in significant ways. We praise God that in the midst of these challenges people continued to seek God and declare Jesus as

their Savior. Since our last constituency session, there have been 2,399 baptisms. By the grace of God, our communities of faith will continue to grow and thrive as we remain centered on our mission and on God's heart for His people.

We have also seen God bless us financially as a conference. Verlon Strauss, our conference treasurer, was happy to announce that over the past three years we have been able to present balanced budgets to our executive committee. The 2021 annual budget included a plan to send 0.5% of the tithe back to each church. During the pandemic, we provided over \$2 million in additional funds for education. Though we experienced hard times due to the pandemic, God has blessed us financially through the faithfulness of our members. Our need to use endowment earnings for our operations has decreased.

Ellen White for a New Generation

In late September, the Victorville Pathfinders hosted a special Pathfinder Sabbath in which they paid tribute to Ellen G. White.

Marilyn Hood, the Victorville Pathfinder leader, wrote a short play about Mrs. White. Hood wanted to inspire young people to investigate who this woman was. The play included vignettes about young Ellen, how the Lord provided for the needs of the White family, and the discovery of land in a small town called Loma Linda where God revealed a school should be built.

"It is so important for us to remember that she was a real person. She was a loving wife, a mother, a neighbor, a church leader, and friend. And she was far ahead of her time in the matters of health and family," Hood told those who attended.

The program featured Pathfinders past and present. Dylan Siregar, a current Pathfinder, read the Scripture. Chalsea-Lee Sweet, a former Pathfinder, played Ellen G. White. She grabbed attention as she began the presentation with the shout, "You will see the Lord a-coming!" Sweet shared the stage with Lila Cervantes, a recording artist who flew in for this event. Cervantes shared several musical selections during the production.


Kaitlyn Parks, another former

Victorville Pathfinder who now serves as a part of the Pathfinder staff, also helped with this special day. In describing this program about Ellen G. White, she believed the program helped to "educate others about her struggles, triumphs, and devotion to the people in her community and the all-giving God she served."

The congregation was also blessed to hear a sermon from then Associate Youth Director, now Executive Secretary Patricia Marruffo. She laid a challenge before them. "Imagine what the world would look like today if every single Pathfinder and follower of Jesus Christ lived in the reality of God's priorities, serving and loving.... What might the world see in us if we became one-way missionaries right here, right in this community, where you live, in your neighborhoods, in our churches, in our communities. What would our world look like?" Marruffo queried.

In addition to highlighting the ministry of Ellen G. White during the program, some of her books were made available for people to enjoy. The day ended with a dinner to thank the sponsors of the Pathfinder Club. Deputy

Director John Hood gave a prayer, and Sweet led the Pathfinders and sponsors in the Pathfinder song. Recounting the day, Margie Hood said, "The Pathfinders were amazing. You felt the Holy Spirit, and the church was on fire!"
